# ISO TRAP TESTING STANDARDS

The trap testing standards are based on ISO (International Organization for Standardization) standards. Every 5 years, the countries that are a members must vote to keep the ISO/TC 191 active. Partners from the U.S., Canada, and Europe worked together to garner the needed votes and successfully maintain the standards.

#### **CBD**

The CBD spent over two weeks negotiating the final text of the GBF. After much debate and controversy, it is now up to the governments that are signatories to the Convention to begin implementation. The 23 targets will guide the work of Canadian and U.S. federal Administrations and impact federal policy. It will be important to be at the table early on to (con't next page)

#### **CITES**

The CITES Technical Work Group (Team) and Ryan Brown (VA) attended CITES CoP19. Key agenda items included zoonotic diseases and One Health, the CITES Strategic Vision, the conservation of amphibians, eels, seahorse, queen conch, and species listing proposals. of indigenous, local, and rural communities; zoonotic diseases; and CITES workload and the impact that is having on the implementation of the Convention. The CoP adopted 46 of the 52 species proposals and over 350 decisions that added new measures and policies on international trade. These North American species are now listed in CITES Appendix II: Alligator and common snapping turtles, five species of broadheaded map turtles, all mud turtles except for the two species already included in Appendix I, all musk turtles, all U.S. soft-shelled turtles (Apalone species), the desert horned lizard, Mexican prairie dog, redfish sea cucumber (Thelenota spp.), and Rhodiolia spp. The Aleutian cackling goose, shorttailed albatross, and Puerto Rican boa were downlisted from Appendix I to II.
